Bees and Trees

For more than 20 years, we have been hearing stories of the Honeybee colony collapse. In the latest survey, we've added nearly 1,000,000 colonies in the last five years. Native to Europe and brought to this country, Honeybees colonies are used by farmers to pollinate their crops. Almonds, followed by blueberries, apples, cherries and cranberries, are some of the main crops pollinated by honeybees. So maybe we've turned a corner. I'll take good news where it can be found!

So, what can you do?

Plant a White Oak tree - they support over 550 insect species. Be careful about using pesticides, particularly mosquito sprays. Plant more native flowers (you may have to ask) to provide a food source for all our native insects and the wildlife that they support all season long.

I can hardly believe that it's been (?) 3 years since I was asked if I could help with our Franciscan sister Kathy.

She had suffered a series of medical conditions that affected her mobility and her memory. Her husband and family really wanted her to stay at home, but quickly realized that they would need help. They hired caregivers for the afternoons, but needed someone to sit with her a couple mornings a week so her husband could work. I wanted to help so I said "yes", ...so after morning mass every Tuesday I bring her communion and stay a few hours until the caregiver comes. In the beginning I'd play the mass for

her on my iPad and she would follow along and we would say the responses and prayers. Sometimes we listened to music, looked at art books, did puzzles, or watched movies. She especially liked looking at family photo albums. Weather permitting, we ventured outside with the wheelchair. I tried doing some simple physical therapy exercises, but I quickly found out she had her own ideas on what she didn't want to do!

As you can imagine, she has slowly become less mobile, her short-term memory is not good, and she rarely speaks whole sentences. Her diabetes has limited what she can eat, she has lost weight, and has become frail in front of my eyes. To make matters worse, she unfortunately fell and broke her hip. Kathy is a fighter, and she has a lot of people praying for her, so it was no surprise she came back home after surgery, rehab, and PT.

Kathy's days now are pretty much routine. Her husband does all her morning care, and most of her meals. We watch a lot of morning tv. It seems easier, but what you don't see on the surface are the difficult moments, struggles, and frustrations! The countless Dr. Appointments, medication mix ups, and insurance nightmares, and the paperwork and bills! Did I mention a broken water heater, her husband's biking accident, a trip to the ER (or 2) and a kitchen repair project?

Kathy falls asleep a lot now, but I still get a glimmer of her sense of humor, and, yes, her stubbornness! I especially love her one-liners that she directs to me when I ask her a stupid question!

Her family is so very grateful for all we do, but truly I'm the grateful one! I am constantly amazed and humbled by Kathy's brave struggles, and her family's caring and love that I have had the <u>privilege to witness</u>. I know in my heart that Kathy doesn't know my name, and probably will not remember my visits, but I will continue to keep my Tuesday mornings free for my sister **Kathy** as long as she needs me!

[HE WOULD GIVE AWAY THE TUNIC HE WAS WEARING TO HELP THE POOR]

Once when he was traveling through a certain region preaching, two brothers from France happened to meet him. From this they enjoyed great consolation. Finally, out of the great devotion they had toward him, for the love of God they asked for his tunic. As soon as he heard "The love of God," he immediately took off his tunic, remaining naked for almost an hour.

For it was blessed Francis's custom when someone said to him "for the love of God, give me your tunic or cord," or anything else that he had, he would immediately give it to them out of reverence for that Lord who is called Love. Furthermore he would be greatly displeased, and would reprimand the brothers when he heard them invoking the love of God needlessly. For he would say: "The love of God is so very exalted that it should be mentioned with great reverence rarely and only in dire necessity." Then one of the brothers took off his tunic and gave it to him.

Very often he endured great need and hardship when he gave away his tunic or a part of it to someone, because he could not quickly find or have another one made. This was true especially since he always wished to have and to wear a poor tunic made of bits and pieces, and occasionally he wanted it patched on inside and out. Because he rarely, if ever, wanted to have or wear a tunic made from new cloth, but would acquire one worn by a brother for a long time, and sometimes he would even accept one part of his tunic from one brother and the rest from another. But, because of his many illnesses and the cold, he would occasionally patch it on the inside with new cloth.

He held and observed this kind of poverty in his clothing until the year when he returned to the Lord. For a few days before his death, because he was suffering from dropsy, he was almost completely dehydrated and weakened by many of the other sicknesses he had, the brothers made several tunics for him, so that they could change his tunic night and day as was necessary.
